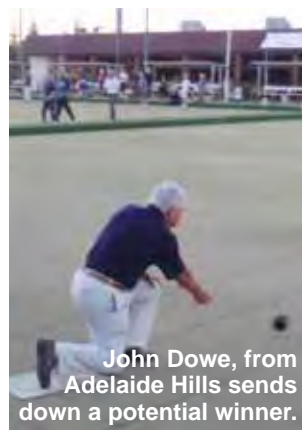




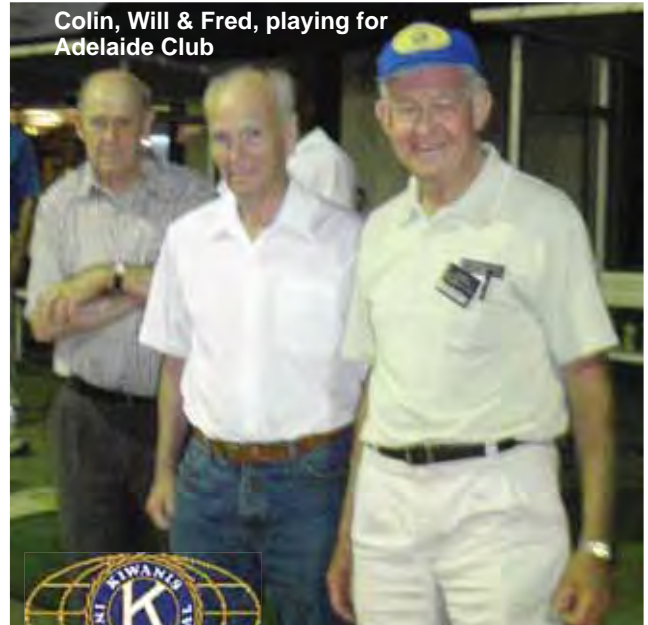

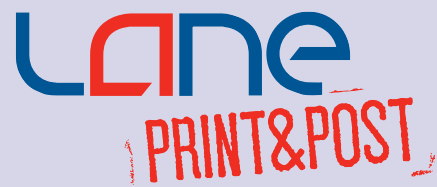

Lt Governor Div 3 Alan Williams, together with Secretary Ken, Ray Packer and Allan Forrester, enjoyed the Combined African States afternoon in the South Parklands which was organised by Eveline and Joseph Fombason and committee. From all accounts, the Fombasons looked resplendent in their national costumes, and the food was delicious.

Thank you to Lt Gov Alan Williams for conducting our Club Analysis at our last meeting.

- f. Project / Fund-raising ideas included Barbecue at Brewery Lights; letting organisations know that we are available; a free advert in the City Messenger; a Bowls Day at Holdfast Bay; a film night; assisting Burnside East Adelaide with their barbecues; Kiwanis Care Kits for Teen Challenge; applying for a grant from the Adelaide City Council for Teen Challenge; teaching English as a second language; a men's shed; earning \$1,000 to sell President Janine's motor-home.
- g. Matters still to be discussed include Club outings, eg a visit to the Botanic Gardens, our annual Church service (suggested Archer Street Presbyterian Church); inter-club visits; guest speakers.

President Janine and Secretary Ken were endorsed as delegates to the Kiwanis International Convention in Las Vegas in June.

The Treasurer, Peter O'Keefe reported on our share of income from Div 3 catering at the Brewery Lights and the ABC Christmas show; outstanding dues and debts. 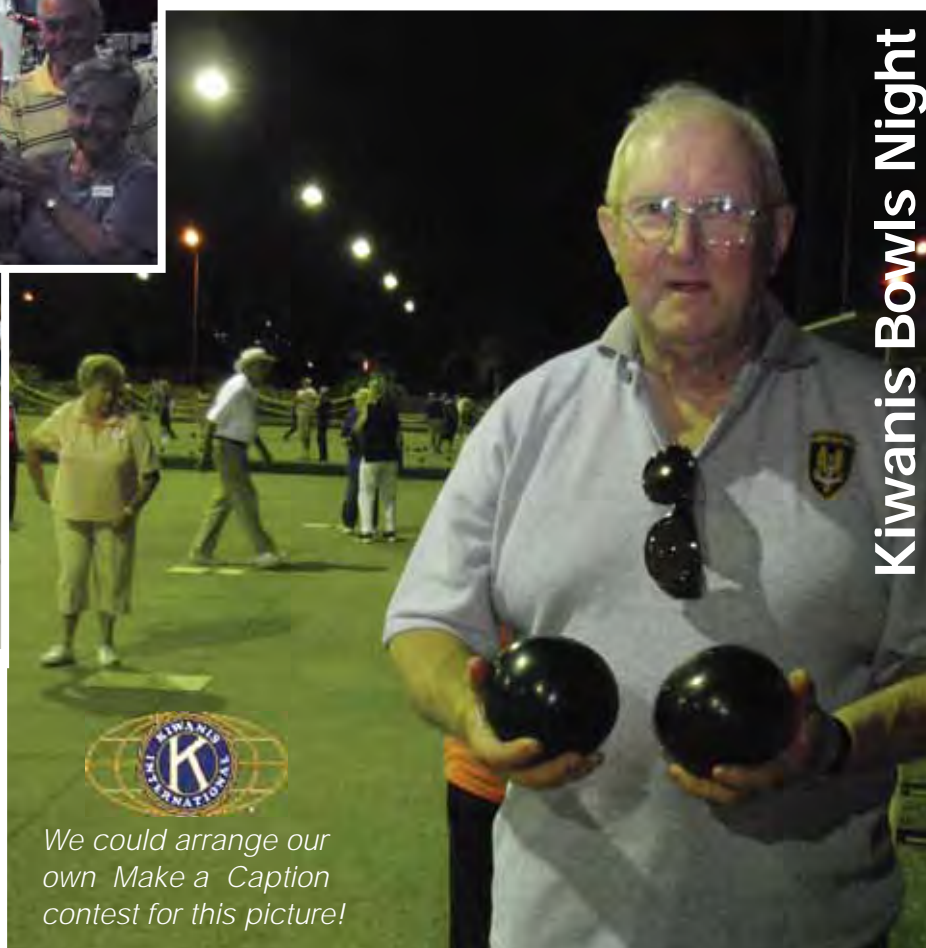

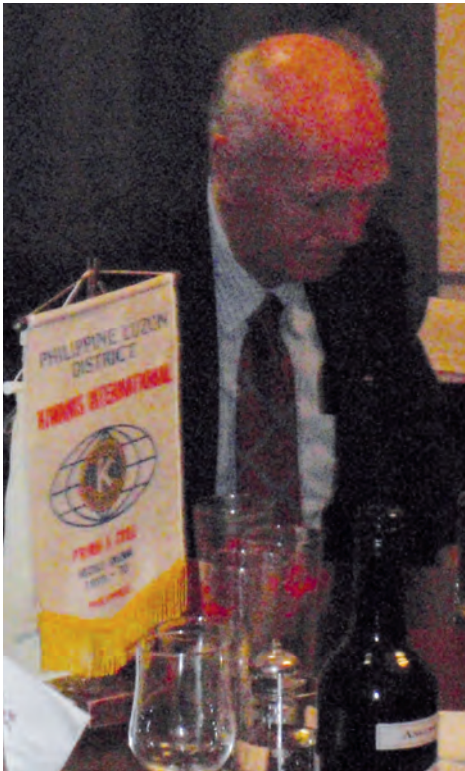
Speaker Spot



The Dinner Meeting on February 9 was our first official Kiwanis get-together for 2010, and we were pleased to welcome Will Baker (introduced by Colin Brookes) as our guest speaker.

Will described himself as a Volunteer at the Adelaide Botanic Gardens - he has a son & daughter and grand-children, and since his wife died a few years ago, this former school teacher was casting around for something to occupy his days. He retired relatively young, at 57, and his interest in wood-turning led to a developmental interest in trees and shrubs.

This soon led Will to the Botanic Gardens, and he mentioned "The Seeds of Change" a book on our city's Botanic Gardens. Ron's knowledge of this topic was extensive and he happily shared with us plenty of anecdotal notes about The Gardens.

Less than 20 years after Adelaide was founded (1836), the first proper Gardens were established, although in 1836 near the River Torrens, there had been a nursery set up - which in nature was semi-commercial, so it probably didn't really qualify as a Botanic Gardens. The current site on North Terrace is actually the fifth site used, and was originally designated as police paddocks.

Bordering the site of The Gardens where our Wine Centre stands, housed the Lunatic Asylum (a term that wouldn't be used these days), with a building several storeys high. In those early days of trying to establish proper public Gardens, fences had to be erected, partly to keep stock out, but also to keep people from stealing plants! (Nothing much changes from century to century!)

As you enter the current Botanic Gardens there's a huge peppercorn at the entrance, planted last century and which is probably the oldest plant in The Gardens. All establishment work in those early days was done by hand - no mechanical tools or suchlike to help.

George Francis was the first Director, having 12 people under him whose main implements were a couple of shovels and a wheelbarrow! Will related how Mr Francis retired in 1865 - and died two days later. Richard Schlomberg was his successor and held the post for 26 years. At this stage, the fledgling SA colony was experiencing good economic times.

There are Moreton Bay Figs in The Gardens that are over 160 years old. Other long-lived inhabitants include a Yew tree from UK and a Dawn Redwood from China. Magnolias are the oldest flowering trees and interestingly

have no smell to attract bees. The Ginkgo is an example of the oldest "woody" trees.

In 1877 the German-built Palm-house was constructed - and imported to Adelaide to adorn our Gardens. It arrived with windows broken however. This interesting edifice was closed to the public in 1986 for refurbishment. It had lots of rust, etc, and was reopened in 1995 as a tropical Palm-house. The re-launch of this building featured plants from Southern Madagascar which don't need much water, and this factor helped mitigate the corrosion around metal windows which had been a big problem earlier.

Will mentioned how one of the adjacent original tram barns is still standing - with a new use these days. The magnificent unusually shaped Conservatory was opened late in 1988 and has the largest single span in the southern hemisphere. Its water use and humidity levels are computer controlled, and this amazing building can even collect rainwater (on those rare occasions when we are lucky enough to receive rain!).

We were advised how the Mt Lofty Botanic Gardens opened in 1850s, and the Wittunga Gardens at Blackwood opened 20 years later, so they are long-established. It's important to realise with the main Botanic Gardens on North Terrace, there are daily public walks - with guides (Ron is one of those guides) - and did you know? - the first Adelaide Zoo was sited in the precincts of The Gardens.

Those Kiwanians who heard Will's terrific talk included President Janine, Joan & Peter O'K, Garry, Lindsay, Fred, Colin, Graham, Don, Alan F, David, Ken and Krystyna K.

The latest Newsletter from Barossa Club mentions that from March to May, they will be visiting South Australian Clubs to show the video of Otto and Peter, plus hand out information packs on the upcoming Convention.

Magdalene Centre which our Kiwanis Club has been along to, was mentioned in the Minutes, along with a city Greening Group which holds regular working bees, tending to inner city public gardens, the most recent being the native gardens in Whitmore Square. Chandler Giles advises that the next meeting of SWCC is on May 19.

Did you know? "Advance Australia Fair" was written by Peter Dodds McCormick (1834-1916) and was first performed on November 30, 1878. But it was not until April 19, 1984 that the Governor-General of Australia proclaimed "Advance Australia Fair" as the National Anthem. Janine came across this version which lists the rarely seen third verse.

Anniversaries - March & April

Anniversaries can be generally rather special to commemorate each year and we haven't printed the following dates before in KAN, but they are quite significant on the Kiwanis Australia calendar, so bear with us while we mention the following:

EDWIN T. LEES Regarded by many as the Founder of Kiwanis in Australia, back in the 1960s. Known as Bill, and based in Melbourne, this special man was the first District Governor of Australia, although the proclamation was initially termed "Provisional" due to the infancy of Kiwanis in this country. The first Australian Kiwanis Club was formed in 1966 in Victoria and District status was sought three years later. Bill passed away on March 22, 1998.

DES FAGAN Also based in Melbourne, Des (shown at right) was Australia District Governor 1970 / 1971. He was born during the Great War, on March 8, 1915 and the anniversary of his passing is nearing, that date being 11th April, 2001. Des is pictured on the night our Adelaide Club was chartered, July 14, 1969.

The lower photo is of Ken Farmer with Bill Lees at the initial organisation of our Club.

Both Bill and Des liaised with Adelaide's Ken Farmer for quite some time, providing the catalyst for the formation of SA's first Kiwanis Club - our own Adelaide Club. Just an additional piece of this Club's history.

1927 - 2009

President Janine recently received a lovely Thank You card from Pat Bennett, acknowledging our tributes to the Bennett family after Harold passed away in November last year. The text is reproduced below:

Janine

I would like to thank you and the members of your Kiwanis Club for the wonderful sentiments placed in The Advertiser on the sad occasion of Harold's death. Then there was the blonde who returned the scarf she received for Christmas. It was too tight apparently....

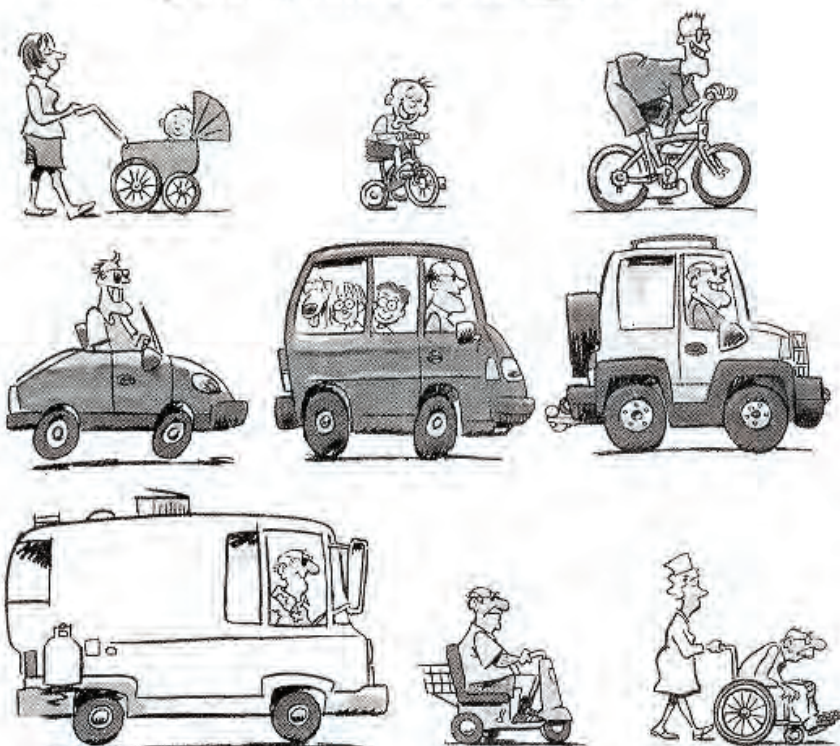
